Immunisation Programme Updates

Changes to the Shingles Programme

From 1 September 2023, Zostavax will be replaced by 2 doses of Shingrix vaccine and there will be changes to the eligibility for shingles vaccine.

The immunocompromised cohort will be extended to those aged 50 years and over and should be offered 2 doses of Shingrix with a period between doses of 8 to 26 weeks.

The immunocompetent cohort will be extended to those aged 60 years and over with a period between doses of 26 to 52 weeks. The expansion of the immunocompetent cohort will take place over 2 5-year stages, with the first 5-year stage offering vaccine to those turning 65 and 70 years of age in each of the 5 years as they become eligible.

The current 70- to 79-year-old cohort should be offered 2 doses of Shingrix with a period of 26 and 52 weeks between doses, following the depletion of Zostavax. Zostavax should be offered initially to those aged 70 to 79 years old before 1st September 2023 until Zostavax supplies have been exhausted.

A summary of the eligible groups and vaccine schedules to be offered from 1 September 2023 to 31 August 2024 can be found at the top of the next page.

Practice call/recall for the immunocompromised and immunocompetent cohorts as they become eligible for the programme will be implemented from 1 September 2023, as well as catch-up call/recall for the newly eligible immunocompromised 50-69-year-old cohort.

Shingles can be delivered at any time during the year thus enabling practices to manage timing for when the individual is invited and can also be opportunistically delivered if clinically appropriate when an individual attends the practice for another reason.

Men B and PCV Catch Up Doses

Following a number of queries regarding catch up schedules for children new to the practice, please note that Men B and PCV13 vaccines should not be offered after the age of 2 years to healthy children. Men B should, however, be offered to patients with asplenia, splenic dysfunction or complement disorders if first diagnosed after the age of 2 years. BCG Eligibility Changes

Please note that, in 2022, that WHO updated their estimates for high risk Tuberculosis countries here: <u>Tuberculosis by country: rates</u> per 100,000 people - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)

The document is still titled as 2020 data, but there have been changes to eligibility for BCG vaccination based on this updated data, and therefore we ask that anyone referring a baby for BCG vaccine accesses the document to update any eligibility lists within their workplace to ensure referrals are appropriately made.

SCID Results and Rotavirus Vaccination

It is important that SCID (Severe Combined Immunodeficiency) screening results are checked for babies before administering the first dose of rotavirus vaccine at 8 weeks of age, due to the risk of these patients receiving a live vaccine. Although SCID screening has not yet been implemented in this area as part of newborn bloodspot screening, there may be children who have come from other areas and have been offered SCID screening.

European Immunisations Week

This year's European Immunisation Week kicked off a 'year of immunisation', in which the World Health Organization brings awareness to a concerning global decline in vaccination rates and the need for children in particular to catch-up on any missed doses. Screening Programme Updates

BOWEL

Bowel Cancer Screening Age Extension

Bowel Cancer Screening age is due to extend to start including those aged 54 years old from April 2023. The final age extension to include 50- and 52-year-olds is due to be rolled out in 2024. Those presenting with symptoms of bowel cancer should continue to be referred via the symptomatic pathway.

CERVICAL

Expiry Dates of Liquid Based Cytology (LBC) Vials

Please be aware that LBC vials have an expiry date. It is the sample takers responsibility to ensure that there is robust stock rotation and to check the vials they are using. The expiry date on the vial indicates the last day on which the vial can be tested by the lab, not the last day on which it can be used to place a sample in. Please ensure there are at least 14 days until the expiry date on the vial before you take a sample.

Remember:

1. To check that the vial expiry date is not obscured by the patient label.

2. The expiry date format is YYYY/MM/DD as indicated on the vial
